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#### Pilrig Park School welcomes Mr Jamie Hepburn MSP

We were delighted to welcome Mr Jamie Hepburn, Minister for Higher Education and Further Education, Youth Employability and Training to our school on Tuesday 31<sup>st</sup> January.

The Minister met with our senior pupils to hear about how our partners support them to achieve positive destinations post school. He learned from our young people about the skills and opportunities we offer here at Pilrig Park School. Mr Hepburn heard about a selection of employability skills our pupils are currently learning as part of their senior phase curriculum including salon skills, gardening, and hospitality. Edinburgh College links and how they help to promote further education pathways into employment and training, was also a topic for discussion during our pupil voice session with the Minister.

Mr Hepburn heard from our partners, staff and the Leadership Team about the multi- agency approach that the school has developed and how this greatly supports our young people achieve positive destinations. The visit was an excellent opportunity for us to share our experiences and most importantly for our young people to express what they think about leaving school and the opportunities offered to them, including any challenges they may face.

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
## **Red Class**

Orange had a wonderful time this term visiting the National Museum of Scotland! The pupils took part in a fun workshop all about space and got to explore parts of the Museum.






## **Green Class**






### <u>Maths</u>

### **Developing the Young Workforce**



#### **Balfour Beatty Construction site visit**

#### Animal Care

The Animal Care group have been out on 2 trips this term.

In January we visited Pets At Home at Fort Kinnaird. We saw lots of different types of animals: mammals, fish, reptiles, amphibians and insects, but no birds apart from the squeaky duck dog toy that one of the pupils bought!

#### **Our Rooftop Allotment**

As you may know, we won a grant a long, long time ago to create a rooftop allotment. After a bit of a wait, we finally received all our items: from seeds to trees and tubs to trugs.

So now the real work has begun. We started by gathering all the tubs and trugs into one space. We also cleared out all the rubbish from the roof terrace. We were left with a big, blank space.

We planted up the fruit trees, we will eventually have apricots, plums, apples and pears. After Easter we plan to plant up spring onions, radishes, peas, herbs and some flowers. Last year we planted strawberries and rhubarb, and both of these crops are doing well.

We also have a lovely wormery which is doing really well, and we hope to get a compost bin up there too.

By the Summer we should have a good variety of fruit, vegetables and herbs growing there.













#### Eco Update

Throughout the year, Red Class have carried out weekly recycling for all classes and communal areas. Barra class are collecting and emptying the compost bins weekly too. **WELL DONE ALL!** 





In February, Red class asked Miss O'Hagan if she would buy some reusable cups for the dining hall. We wrote a letter to the dining hall staff to ask for their help in washing the reusable cups. **This has reduced our plastic consumption in school.** 

In Red class, our current focus across Social Studies and Science is on climate change and pollution. Here are our pollution catchers hanging in the gazebo in the playground:

Recently, we read the stories 'Somebody Swallowed Stanley' and 'Somebody Crunched Colin', which highlight the dangers to animals of littering, and that many items which are recycled can be reused, and made into new items. We also watched a short video about the harmful effects of littering on wildlife. Following this film, we decided to make our own seagull covered in litter to highlight this serious issue, which Mrs Ferguson has kindly displayed in the foyer with her Spring collection.





In the Eco cause Barra recycled some toilet rolls into binoculars so they could check if birds were eating from the feeders made in Art. Inspiration for this came from watching the amazing David Attenborough







The Eco Team are in the latter stages of their Draft Action Plan for the ECO Schools Scotland Green Flag Award and will be submitting the application before the end of the academic year.
